

"I am writing to thank you. I am interested in studying chemistry and biology and am working toward completing the pre-medical track at Dartmouth...

...On campus, I spend a lot of time in labs, between my courses and my work at DHMC. For my work at DHMC I received a research grant through the Sophomore Science Scholars program and in my lab I am contributing toward Professor Mulligan-Kehoe's atherosclerosis research. In addition to my work at DHMC I volunteer through the Big Brothers Big Sister program at Dartmouth and meet with my "little sib" Taya for a few hours each week…"
