



Dick Roberts returns to the Caribbean this fall, teaching medicine and helping to establish a program for prevention and control of acute rheumatic fever and rheumatic heart disease in St. Vincent and the Grenadines. It will involve all the islands (population 115,000) and 14,900 children in the 68 primary schools.

Dave Stricker: Still Giving

Dave Stricker devoted most of his professional life to The Blake School in Minneapolis and the Boys and Girls Club of the Twin Cities, where he was the president. But wait, that's not all! There's still much to do! In this time of high unemployment, Dave is helping meet the nation's need for job training as executive director of a lean but muscular and highly successful training program for the toughest customers of all, former prison inmates.

Launched nearly a decade ago by a Minneapolis contractor, Adolfson & Peterson Construction, it's called the Construction Career Training Program, or CCTP. It works with for-profit and not-for-profit orga-



nizations, and every year places scores of ex-inmates in jobs, as many as 80 in a single year. About 80 percent stick with their first jobs for at least a year, Dave says, and only 10 percent commit crimes again. Average pay: \$13 an hour.

The program focused first on building trades, but amid the recent construction downturn CCTP has cast a wider net to make placements in retailing, restaurants and hospitality jobs, factories, warehouses, and other sectors of the economy.

Dave says the organization has come a long way since 2003, when it started with just \$5,000 in the bank, seven job applicants and no jobs to offer. CCTP now has a growing list of partners and a presence in Arizona. It's looking to expand in cities such as Dallas, Denver and Seattle. Closer to home, CCTP recently joined the R3 Collaborative, a collection of 65 organizations that work together to "transform and heal broken lives impacted by incarceration and addiction."

It costs CCTP about \$1,850 to work with each applicant from the time he walks in the door to the time he starts his new job. That compares with an average annual cost of \$34,000 to \$37,000 to keep an inmate in prison, according to Dave.
