Dedication of the Robert Frost Statue area and "The Rise"

June 10, 2023 ~ 10:30 a.m.

Serendipity took over when Alumni Affairs introduced 1961 and 1973 representatives for a discussion. Both classes were separately interested in funding certain improvements to an area on College Hill between Bartlett Tower and the Shattuck Observatory, the highest elevation on the Dartmouth campus and directly above the Bema.

The '61's have been most attached to this place for many years, following relocation by the College of the statue the '61's commissioned to honor Robert Frost 1896, a treasured English class lecturer. It was previously located adjacent to Silsby Hall. The new setting is a wonderful improvement and has quickly become a rallying place for class gettogethers. In 2021, one of their members proposed constructing a rural stone wall along the bank so Frost would appear to be looking across it as he composed his poem "The Mending Wall". A place to sit near the statue was also suggested.

Chugging down a parallel path for their 50th reunion, the '73's were hoping to create a small "pocket park" for individual or group contemplation and reflection. The goal was to find a convenient spot with a view of Baker Tower, an iconic element for many. A planning team was created which worked closely with the College community to consider possibilities. With encouragement, a landscape architect was retained to help guide the process. As their project grew in scale, Alumni Affairs suggested in the spring of 2022 that the '73 team should meet with their '61 counterparts, to ensure their efforts would be complementary and enhance one another.

Everyone who participated in the joint process (both classes, Dartmouth staff, various community members, and consultants) have remained enthusiastic and supportive as the project has evolved. The budget has grown substantially, but the project team is pleased and proud of what you see here today, and grateful to our benefactors. The design intent was to use a light touch and create something timeless, appropriate, and fitting for this beautiful place - "hiding in plain sight" we like to say. The main elements include: selective tree thinning and pruning to enhance the views, invasive plant removal, a curved stone wall opposite Mr. Frost with a curved wooden bench top designed and created by Dwight Sargent '72 atop forged iron bases designed and fabricated by Dimitri Gerakaris '69, a circle of stone "benches" (boulders) with a small "sneak stair" headed down to the Observatory parking lot, and plantings designed to thrive in the local climate and appear indigenous. The improved main walkways and access to the contemplative stone benches are handicapped accessible to maximize safety and enjoyment for the entire Dartmouth family and the general public. This was a key element for us. Above all, we hope the changes appear to have been made when Bartlett Tower was built, a wonderful example of class participation from 1885-1895.

The '73 team have come to refer to their portion of the site as "The Rise".

This seems to have been well received by the college community and we're confident Robert Frost would have agreed too.
