

Frank Hadley Ginn April 26, 1939 - February 9, 2016

Frank Hadley Ginn, age 76, passed away on February 9, 2016. He was the beloved husband of Madge Ginn; loving father of Peter Ginn, Tony (Mary Bush) Ginn and Sarah Ginn (Gregory) Harris; dear grandfather of Georgia Port and Huck Ginn and William and Hadley Harris; loving brother of Mary Ginn, Patty Feeney and Walter Ginn.

Frank grew up in Hunting Valley, OH. He graduated from Dartmouth College and received his MBA from the University of Chicago. Early in his career, Frank worked for Booz Allen Hamilton. Later he focused on business consulting for many nonprofit

organizations throughout the city of Chicago.

Frank was involved with the Village of Winnetka as a member of the Caucus, he served as an election judge, and chaired the Board of the Samaritan Counseling Center. Frank will be remembered as a warm, caring man who loved being with family, friends and his dogs. He also enjoyed traveling and spending time in Nantucket, MA.

A memorial service was held on Saturday, March 5, 2016, at 11:00 a.m. at Winnetka Congregational Church, 725 Pine Street, Winnetka, IL 60093.

Frank and Madge Ginn have been long-time, very contributive members of Winnetka Congregational Church where the memorial service was held. Frank, among other roles, chaired the church's "Mission Doing" committee some years ago.

Madge planned a perfect celebration of Frank's life, in which 3 kids, 4 grandkids and a brother spoke on the theme "reflections of love." Included were comments about Frank's love for Dartmouth, especially his role in reunion planning, and his joy in reconnecting with treasured friends from the class of '61.

Frank's dementia advanced rapidly over the last 10 years, to the point where he spent several years in a care facility. Even though he had been out of contact most of that

time, the church was full of friends and admirers from the church, the Winnetka community, clients of his consulting practice (human resources services to not-for-profit organizations), and representatives of the not-for-profits on the boards of which he had served. Among these was the Samaritan Counseling Center in Winnetka; Frank oversaw a major turn-around of that agency and later served as president of its board.

Also noted were Frank's love of the University School in Cleveland (which he attended for 13 years), Nantucket, skiing, cycling, and running in marathons. Among the adjectives used to describe him: loyal, enthusiastic, happy and devilish.
