**Class of 1961 Mini-Reunion to Celebrate
our Class' Performing Arts Legacy**

April 4 - 6, 2003

Kronos Quartet concert on April 5

We have 30 tickets to the Kronos Quartet concert which will be held in Spaulding Auditorium in Hopkins Center at 8:00 PM on Saturday, April 5. The concert is sponsored, in part, by the Class of 1961 Performing Arts Legacy Endowment Fund.

Since its inception in 1973, the “unswervingly hip Kronos Quarter” has seized the attention of audiences worldwide for its fearless dedication to experimentation. Kronos is virtually synonymous with musical innovation, with a penchant for world music, rock and jazz. The Hop collaborates with Kronos to commission a composer under the age of 30, whose work has its world premiere at Dartmouth.

The weekend will commence with dinner at Grenache (in Centerra Park) on Friday evening. Grenache just recently opened to rave reviews. Details are still being worked out for a program on Saturday, but we expect to have our two Arts Initiative Students, Sheridan Fox and Jessica Tam meet with us to talk about their Children's Literature and Illustration project.

Cocktails (starting at 5:00) and dinner at 6:00 will be held in the Hayward Lounge on the main floor of the Hanover Inn. We hope to have Sheridan and Jessica, as well as Lewis Crickard, Director of the Hopkins Center, attend our dinner. The concert begins at 8:00.

Lastly, we will have a farewell brunch at the Hanover Inn. We've also arranged for a block of rooms at the Norwich Inn. The prices range from \$65 (motel) to \$89 (inn); since there's a Trustees meeting that weekend, you should make your reservations as soon as possible.

Final costs aren't finalized. However, the tickets for the concert are \$28 each, the dinners will probably cost between \$25 and \$30 per person, including taxes and gratuity, and the brunch should hopefully be less than \$20 per person. There's also a possibility that we'll have to pay for a room for the Saturday sessions.

Then send \$28 for each Kronos Quarter ticket to guarantee availability. You should make your hotel reservations directly. The Norwich Inn's number is 802-649-1143.

Competitive swimming at Dartmouth eliminated/reinstated

On the morning of November 25, Dartmouth College's Athletic Director announced the decision to eliminate the men's and women's swimming and diving teams in order to meet budget cuts. Since that startling November news, much has happened. **Bob Conn** reports: "The Dartmouth men's and women's varsity swimming and diving program will be continued through a funding agreement between a group of students, alumni, and parents and the Dartmouth administration. The agreement making it possible for the program to be continued is the result of discussion and collaboration between the Dartmouth administration, students, alumni and parents. It calls for the program to be continued through the 2003-04 season with funds reallocated internally, and for 10 years after that by the proceeds from a \$2 million fund-raising effort."

And, **Mike Houlahan** provided this information on December 27th: "For those interested, information on fund raising to save swimming at Dartmouth is available at the following Web site <<http://www.b-k-ind.com/dartmouth/#How%20to%20Help>>. To date \$114,000 of the \$212,000 needed to fund a full year has been raised."

Bruce Beasley sculptures on display at Baker Library

You'll discover in the following e-mail I received from **Pete Bleyler** that **Bruce Beasley** has been recognized by The College for his artistic achievement. You'll also find that you can purchase and donate one of Bruce's sculptures to Dartmouth. This is not a Class of '61 project but may be of interest to any of you who are in a position to benefit from a significant tax deduction for a charitable donation.

"Our classmate, Bruce Beasley, is a renowned sculptor working and living in Oakland, CA. After two years at Dartmouth, he transferred to UC Berkeley in 1959 where he completed his training as a sculptor.

"Last winter, he was contacted by Dartmouth regarding a permanent sculpture installation in the new Baker-Berry Library. After much consideration, the College decided on a group of six of his cast bronze sculptures (as well as six sculptures by another artist.)

"His sculptures were unveiled at the dedication of the new library this past November 8. Since Dartmouth doesn't have the funds to purchase them outright, they are on "permanent loan." Bruce, therefore, is looking for donors for the sculptures and contacted me to see if there might be donors from the class of 1961. One of the sculptures already has a donor, so there are five left. (*Prices range from \$26,000 to \$34,000. Ed.*)

"Bruce is willing to set up the purchase and donation in a way that the donor's tax deduction is equal to the purchase price so that the donor is not out of pocket any real money (assuming that they are in the upper tax bracket.)

"... I'm told this is completely legal and one of the most common ways that works of art are acquired by colleges and art museums.
