


Brian Hale Hewins

Brian grew up in Evansville, IN, the oldest of four children. He attended Bosse High School before entering Dartmouth in 1960. He married his high school sweetheart in 1964 and they spent the next four years in Philadelphia. Their first daughter, Becki, was born his senior year.

The next move was to Madison, WI, where Brian spent a year interning at University of Wisconsin. Upon completion of that year the family moved to Ft Sill, OK, where he spent the next two years as a general medical officer in the Army. While here, daughter Julie was born. In addition to military duties he took up flying which meant many adventurous family trips!

The next move, in 1972, a permanent one, was to Los Angeles where he spent four years

as a radiology resident at LA County Hospital. Upon finishing his training he joined Arcadia Radiology Medical Group for the next thirty years.

When not working he became an avid runner, eventually running in the Boston and New York marathons. The family continued to ski several times a year. In addition to skiing Brian became an avid windsurfer leading to several trips in search of the wind. Baja, Hawaii and the Columbia River Gorge were favorites. Cycling also became an interest and he and Bobbi took many trips throughout the US as well as several European countries. An inveterate traveler he and Bobbi managed to see many parts of the world, trying to take one major trip a year.
