Of course with all these fabulous offerings there is a cost involved. We have decided to keep the expenses under \$300, which has not always been the case in

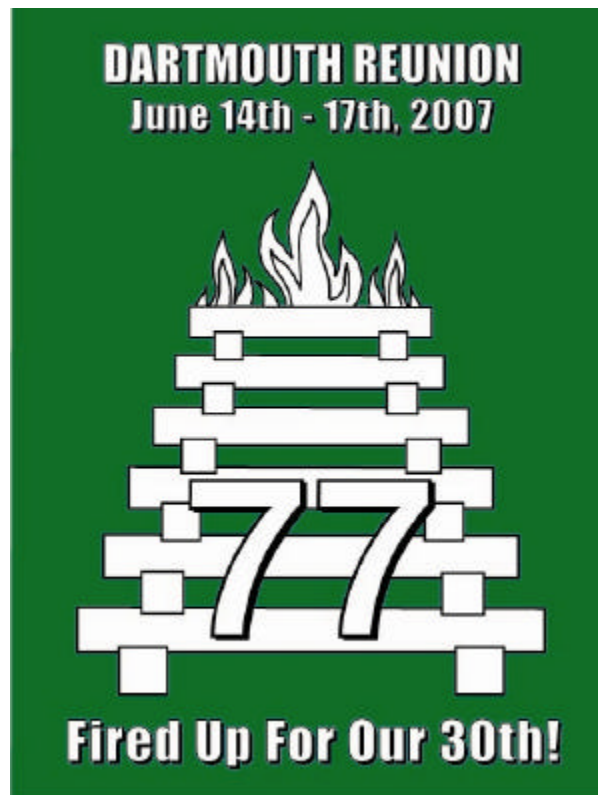

In my current career with Northwestern Mutual, I've had the opportunity and privilege of being able to sit down with many Dartmouth alumni. has led a phenomenally rich life and has a great story to tell about their family, hopes, goals, dreams and accomplishments. Although as individuals we may disagree on politics, the Alumni constitution, and the future course of the college, I think we can all agree that our four years at Dartmouth allowed us to meet, form friendships, and in general hang out with a very special group of people.

As far as my own 30 second history since graduation goes, here are the high and low lights:

1) Graduated as a chemistry major and worked in an analytical lab for 4 years at Clairol. Alumni Council Meeting Report ? November 30-December 2, 2006 ? Hanover, NH

Our meeting came on the heels of the recent Alumni Constitution election so there was a lot to discuss. Several hours were spent hearing from council members, as well as non-members who joined the plenary meetings (open to the public at large), searching for reasons as to why the Constitution vote did not pass. There were many different thoughts on this, but there was a general feeling that the Constitution itself was complex and confusing. Some mentioned that their constituents were annoyed with all the letters and phone calls they received prior to the vote. Others cited disagreement, as well as confusion, with regards to the proposed changes to trustee elections. In addition, we were reminded that 38% of alumni voted thus leaving 62% whose voices were never heard.

As for the appropriate actions the Council should take relative to the governance changes proposed in the defeated Constitution, positions ranged from those encouraging the Council to adopt all of those provisions that were relatively uncontroversial and that the Council has constitutional authority to change on its own, to those who advocated that Council needed to approach change with caution and consideration, doing nothing immediately.

The Council moved forward on these issues in baby steps. First, a small working group was created to study the feedback from the governance session and to look at historical information on the mission and purposes of the Council in order to develop a concise, well-defined mission statement for the Council. (Once this process is completed, another group will re-examine governance issues as they relate to the mission.) Secondly, at the final session of the Council, the College Relations Group presented a resolution stating that the Alumni Council should encourage all bodies that send representatives to the Council to evaluate their election/selection process and take steps to make it more democratic. It was approved.

The Alumni Council also voted to approve three trustee candidates who have demonstrated professional accomplishment, a passion for Dartmouth's excellence and an involvement as alums in the college, independent points-of-view and the ability to handle conflict effectively. The following candidates were selected from a pool of over 300 alumni: Richard "Sandy" Alderson '69, CEO of the San Diego Padres, Sherri Carroll Oberg '82, President and CEO of Acusphere, Inc and Ambassador John Wolf '70, President of Eisenhower Fellowships. You will be asked to vote in the next trustee election this spring when the seat held by Nancy Jeton '76 will be vacated. Please remember that the Nominating Committee works independently and the administration has no control or

say over the selection process. During our two days in Hanover, we heard from many members of the Dartmouth faculty and student body. Jack Wilson, Associate Director of Planning and Construction presented a visual guide to the new facilities. The projects included the new work out facility in Alumni Gym (wait until you see it!), the McLaughlin cluster (which comprises six new residence halls), Kemeny Hall and the Halderman Center.

The Deans of the Dartmouth Graduate Schools also spoke to council members. In listening to the Deans of Tuck, Thayer, the Medical school and Graduate Studies speak it was hard not to be impressed with the array of research and learning opportunities available to undergraduates in the graduate schools. The demand is high and the college has responded well. Dartmouth is still very much a college with the emphasis on the undergraduate, but like our sister schools, undergraduate research opportunities are a must if the college wants to remain competitive in attracting the best and the brightest.

We attended a dinner honoring two alumni who have worked tirelessly for Dartmouth, Otho Kerr '79 and Kelly Fead '78. Their speeches were wonderful and I was inspired by these two busy people finding the time to devote so much energy to the college while holding exciting careers and juggling family and other commitments.

Most of all, I found my opportunity to get back in touch with the Dartmouth community very rewarding. With this in mind, I would like to remind you of the many ways you can stay connected to the college. When in Hanover, take a student to lunch as part of the TASTE program. Send recommendations to the Honorary Degree Committee of alumni you think are worthy of this prestigious award. Submit names for future Trustee candidates. Join the upcoming on-line book club, led by a Dartmouth professor, which will debut this spring. Attend Chalk Talks (professor lectures) before football games or listen to these talks on-line. Partake in the various Alumni Education trips and lectures. Attend sporting events (there's more than football). Spend a weekend in Hanover and talk to the students. I can firmly attest that they love meeting alumni!

As your representative, my role is also to serve as liaison for issues or concerns that you would like voiced to the college on your behalf. I am reachable at my email address, ekadin@gmail.com, and I welcome hearing from you.

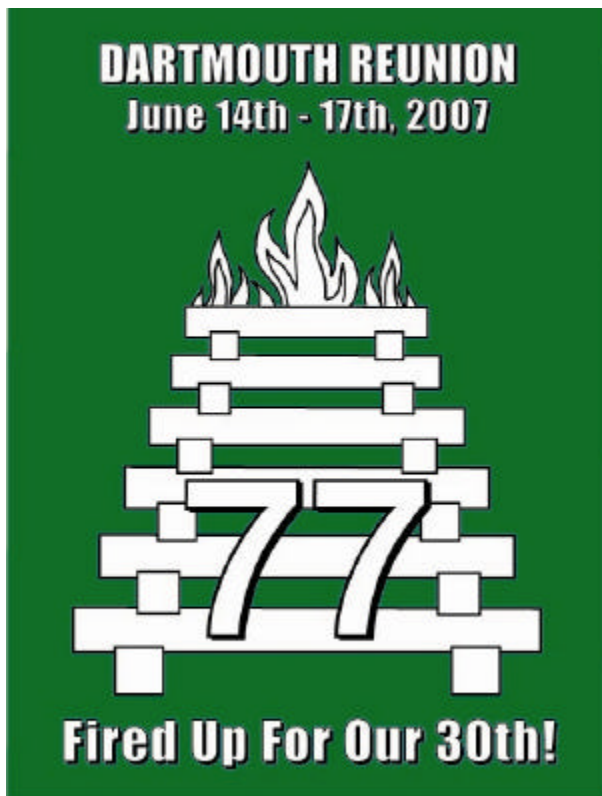
