With the high cost of printing and mailing our Newsletters and our class budget in a deficit principally due to the increasing costs of the Alumni Magazine, we could save a lot of money on Newsletters if we can get to the point of having most or all of our Newsletters appear in electronic form only. As it is, even though we have been printing and mailing Newsletters over the years, we have never been able to afford the exorbitant cost of printing color Newsletters. But with the Internet and related technologies, we have been able to produce and make available on our website full color editions of our last 4 Newsletters. The feedback on the use of color has been fantastic, but when we print and mail, we are forced to convert everything back to black and white due to the high cost of color printing. In addition to being in color, the electronic editions are available on our website a full three to four weeks before the black and white printed edition arrives in your mailbox at home. So go to the website and read or download and print the January 2004 Newsletter. While you are there, give us your e-mail address. Everyone on our e-mail list gets a notification with an electronic link to the Newsletter every time a new edition is posted. At our Class Convocation, John Kemeny spoke eloquently of teaching, liberal arts education and the importance of our Class leaving behind a proud legacy; a significant contribution to the history of Dartmouth. Much is already written on our "page," but there is still plenty of blank space. What other contributions will we make? By giving generously to the Dartmouth College Fund, we provide access to the best liberal arts education in the world: a Dartmouth education.

We have set a Reunion Giving Goal of \$4 million. Through the very generous contributions of many of you, we have reached 60% of that goal as of mid-April: \$2.4 million, with a 43% participation rate. This is good, but it is clear that we can do better, and the next two months are absolutely critical. We ask our classmates — both those who are volunteering their time to our fund-raising efforts and those who are on the receiving end of our entreaties — to give us their focus in the brief period remaining before Reunion. We have set aggressive dollar and participation goals. By all pulling together, we can get there!

**Scholar Challenge! Make a Reunion gift of \$15K and receive a 5K match!** Thanks to the generosity of a core group of 1979 classmates, you can be included at the \$20,000 Dartmouth College Fund Scholar level with a gift of \$15,000 or more in honor of our 25<sup>th</sup> Reunion. This special 1979 Challenge will match new pledges and gifts of \$15,000 to \$19,999 with up to an additional \$5,000 to help you sponsor a DCF Scholar, an honor usually reserved for gifts of \$20,000 and above. Classmates who have already pledged or given and who increase their gift to \$15,000 to \$19,999 will also be eligible for the match.

By participating at this level, you'll get to meet your scholar at a luncheon hosted by President Jim Wright, receive letters and other communication from your Scholar during the year, and feel great when you raise a Dartmouth student's awareness of alumni generosity and the importance of philanthropy. ## 25<sup>TH</sup> REUNION PARTICIPATION COMMITTEE

As we write this in mid-April, the Class of '79 is at 43% participation in the Dartmouth College Fund, which is slightly below our fundraising participation levels at this time last year. It is no secret that we hope to increase our final number from last year's remarkable 61% to 72%. Are we totally insane? How will this happen?

It will happen one classmate at a time. The important thing to remember is that this is our 25<sup>th</sup> Reunion year. This is the year that the College pays serious attention to what our class does, both in terms of total dollars raised and in terms of participation. Accomplishments in this year will be remembered with our class for the next 25 years.

So, to help those of you who have not come in from the cold yet, some of your classmates have helped to sweeten the pot.

**Participation Highs Part I — Into Thin Air.** A generous group of classmates present the following challenge to our Class:

- When we reach 62% (a new record for our Class), they will make a \$25,000 gift to the Fund;
- When we reach 65%, they will donate an additional \$25,000; and
- When we reach 72% (which is our lofty goal), they will donate a final gift of \$50,000.

**Participation Highs Part II — If You Missed Last Year.** The second challenge comes from a Classmate who would like to bring this effort to a very personal level. If you did not make a gift to the Dartmouth Fund in the last fundraising year (02-03) and have not pledged/donated so far this year, that classmate will match up to the first \$100 of any Reunion gift you make by June 30<sup>th</sup>.

So, how high can we go? What's it going to be, Class of '79? Are we going to achieve another 100 tier bonfire that stands the test of time? Until last year when we hit 61%, the Class of '80 gave us a good run each year in the participation category. We'd like to put the 25th Reunion participation record out of reach. Hope you will help with this effort and make your contribution now.

Bush vs. Kerry; Kerry vs. Bush — this race is peanuts compared to the more critical election of the Class of 1979 Class Officers. The next U.S. President only has to worry about the world and Yale — simple compared to the needs and desires of the Dartmouth Class of '79. With this in mind, we have been asked to solicit nominations (mostly self-nominations) for our Class Officers — **so you might as well nominate yourself before one of your good friends nominates you secretly** (that's how I got the Nominating Chairman job)! Consider this an opportunity to give something back to the Class. It's not a financial commitment, just one of time — but one with great rewards including reconnecting with classmates.

Here are the Class Officer spots we need to fill, plus a description. All are five year terms except the Alumni Class Representative which is a three year term:

The **President** will act as the executive head of the Class. It will be his/her responsibility to initiate new projects and carry out policy of the Executive Committee. In addition, the President shall exercise general supervision over all other officers, to ensure the proper performance of their functions.

The **Vice President** will provide back-up to the President. In addition, he/she will be in charge of the Class Project.

The **Secretary** will be the primary link between the individual alumnus and the College, and shall prepare the Class notes and obituary notes for the Dartmouth Alumni Magazine. The Secretary shall be the custodian of Class files and records.

The **Treasurer** of the Class shall receive and disburse all funds of the Class subject to the direction of the Executive Committee, and shall submit an annual financial report to the President.

The **Alumni Council Representative** shall be responsible for communications between the Class and the Alumni Council, representing all interests and concerns.

The **Newsletter Editor(s)** shall be responsible for editing the Class newsletter, generally sent out three times per year. The newsletter will serve as the regular avenue of communication between officers and members of the Class.

The **Mini-Reunion Chair** shall be responsible for the organization and promotion of all major non-Reunion gatherings of the Class.

The **Webmaster** shall be responsible for the electronic communications of the Class, including but not limited to the editing and maintenance of the Class website.

The **Class Historian** is responsible for procuring Memorial Books for deceased classmates and to write memorials for the website.

The **Co-Head Agents** shall conduct the annual Dartmouth College Fund solicitation for the benefit of the College. He/she will coordinate the efforts of the Major Gifts, Participation, Bequest and Reunion Giving Chairs.

The **Major Gifts Chair** shall be responsible for targeting specific members of the Class for the Major Gifts.

The **Participation Chair** shall be responsible for maintaining the high overall giving participation rate for the Class.

The **Bequest Chair** shall be responsible for bequests and trust planning activities of members of the Class for the benefit of the College.

If you have an interest in any or all of these positions or would like to nominate someone else, please contact me (Ken Beer) or any other Nominating Member via email or phone. Maybe call a friend and submit a joint nomination where you could share/split the office — just get involved. Feel free to contact any of the current officers, identified at the top of the Newsletter, about their thoughts on the office including the time commitment and how much they LOVED doing this (they'll say anything to have someone take over for them). ## NEWS FROM THE COLLEGE

### *Dartmouth to Build Kemeny Hall*

John Kemeny, Dartmouth's thirteenth president, was a brilliant mathematician, software pioneer, and humanitarian. Now Dartmouth honors this beloved teacher, scholar, and champion of coeducation and pluralism with Kemeny Hall, a living monument to a Dartmouth legend. The [Mathematics Department](#) is presently spread among three buildings that are old, small, and technologically out-of-date. Kemeny Hall will reunite the department and provide much-needed classrooms, labs, and discussion space for student-faculty collaboration. Kemeny Hall will be located on North Main Street above Baker-Berry Library and Carson Hall, contiguous with the new Academic Centers building.

*'08 Admit Rate Holds at 18%* (The Dartmouth Online, April 5, 2004)

The College's admissions office mailed out a staggeringly high number of rejection letters...to applicants for the Class of 2008, as only 18.3 percent of the 11,733 students who applied were admitted—a number almost as impressive as last year's record-low 18.2 percent admission rate. Of the 2,143 students accepted to the Class of 2008, 384 heard back in December that they would be attending school in Hanover come September. That means that for the over-10,000 regular decision applicants the admission rate was lower still -- just 16.8 percent....Most exceptional of all were the average SAT scores, which jumped 15 points from last year to a record-high combined score of 1457. In the past three years, SAT scores have increased anywhere from 3 to 5 percent, which makes this year's jump particularly notable. The mean SAT verbal score was 726, while the mean SAT math score was 731. Also of interest: 92 percent of students were ranked in the top 10 percent of their high-school class, and 34.1 percent were valedictorians....International student acceptances held near last year's recent high, comprising 7.7 percent of admitted students. Students of color dropped off a little from last year's record high, constituting 36.7 percent of '08 acceptances....Whereas last year slightly more men were accepted than women -- 11 more, to be exact -- this year, women dominate with the largest-ever proportion of admits at 51.1 percent....Six percent of acceptances -- approximately 130 students -- are Dartmouth legacies (*some of which were '79 legacies as we learned in this Newsletter!*)

## TUCKER INTERN REPORT

The Class of 1979 makes contributions to Dartmouth Partners in Community Service through its Class Dues/Class Project program. DPCS sponsors nearly 50 students per year in off term community service projects. The Class gets an opportunity to pair up a student with a Mentor like **Peter Pessoa** just about every term. Following is the story of Jim Baehner '06's internship experience that our class sponsored:

**Jim Baehner '06'**: The Dartmouth Partners in Community Service Mentorship program was a vital part of my time down in Miami, and something I will always remember fondly. I had the great opportunity to be matched with **Peter Pessoa '79** and his fantastic family, and the chance to get to know a Dartmouth alum was a rich and rewarding experience. I received a DPCS grant to work for Habitat for Humanity of Greater Miami. We built five houses on the South Miami site in an underprivileged neighborhood. Getting to know the people who lived in that community, and helping to rebuild over the ruins of a failed housing project, meant a lot to me. The work wasn't always easy, and it was certainly different than a winter in Hanover, but it was the greatest of off-terms.

The mentorship program in particular was tremendous. I got the chance to meet up with Mr. Pessoa on a fairly regular basis for the entire time of my ten week stay. We went out to lunch several times, we had dinner at his house several others, and his son even took me out on the town. His family also made my friend John feel incredibly welcomed, though he wasn't even part of the DPCS program. One of John's great passions is tennis, and the Pessoa's second born son, Steven, happens to be one of the greatest players in the state of Florida. John relished the opportunity to be soundly trounced by him. Mr. Pessoa proved himself to be a great family man and a great businessman, and it was always an education to listen to his advice on all aspects of life. (*Hey! What's up?
