Interview with Kirsten Earl, Class of 1999 Emmy Winner

The following interview is with Kirsten Earl, '99. She is married to Dan Powell, '00 and works for The Martha Stewart Show as a Crafter (her official job title!), designing the crafts that Martha demonstrates and breaking them down into easy-to-follow steps and directions for the home viewer. She also makes props for the set and generally makes the set a place that viewers want to live in! Most recently, Kirsten won an Emmy for her work on the show!

Alma Matters (AM): What was your major at Dartmouth?

Kirsten Earl: I was a Physics major. I actually stayed at Dartmouth for an extra year for some graduate studies in Physics and Astronomy, but decided it wasn't the direction I wanted to go.

AM: Did your major or any extracurricular activities at Dartmouth prepare you for your current job?

Kirsten: I definitely feel like I use my science-y background when I'm at work. At first glance most people would think my major would have NOTHING to do with what I'm doing now, but I can say that having an analytical mind and having experience in a lab really helps when I'm laying out a craft process for Martha to do on television. I have to take a final product and work backwards, splitting it into steps that will make the most sense for Martha and for the viewer. I also write the step-by-step directions for each craft for publishing on our web site. Crafts also use a lot of math - maybe not the advanced specialized calculus I used in physics, but lots of dimensions and percentages and things. And I'm the tech expert for the whole Art Department - anything that needs to be designed on a computer is handed off to me.

AM: What do you do on the Martha Stewart show? What is a typical day like for you?

Kirsten: I work on the craft segments for the show - along with two other "crafters," as they call us, I develop crafts, make the final products, and set up the steps for Martha to show to our viewers. I also make anything that needs to be handmade for the set. There is absolutely no typical day, since every week is a different craft and each one has to be new and inventive. But generally, I spend some time researching and developing crafts with my fellow crafters, some time on making things pretty on set and preparing the segments, and then of course shooting the show, and then some time preparing templates and instructions for all our crafts for the web site.

INTERVIEW WITH KIRSTEN EARL continued from page 3

AM: How did you get your job?

Kirsten: I had a sort of meandering path to this career - my major, as I said earlier, was not directly in line with this profession. I chose to leave grad school in the spring of 2000, and took a job at a theater in NH where I was the Prop Master for their entire summer stock season. I had a really small budget there, so most of our props had to be handmade, and I picked up a lot of skills in my time there. I knew that from there, I wanted to move to New York City to do something in theater or entertainment, but when I got here, I kind of freaked out and desperately took the first job I could find that was more in line with my degree - I became a software developer for this terrible, boring, business-software company. After a few years there, I met my now-husband, and he was very supportive of me finding a job that wouldn't make me miserable. Crafting was something I did with ALL my spare time - my mom taught me to sew at a very young age, and I had been making things with her and on my own my whole life. My now-husband got me in touch with a friend who was a professional crafter/writer who happened to be starting work on a short-lived TV show called Craft Corner Deathmatch for the Style network. She hired me as a crafter for that, and I quit my software job. At CCDM, I was to be lucky enough to work with some people from Martha TV who were filling the time while Martha was um, otherwise occupied (in jail). When Martha was released and started the new "The Martha Stewart Show," my friends from Craft Corner recommended me for the staff, and here I am. A little luck and a lot of really great, supportive people got me my dream job.

AM: Do you have any advice for people who might want to break into the entertainment industry?

Kirsten: I would say that any experience you can get on a TV show or movie will be good experience -- it will help you figure out what part of the industry you like the best, since all the teams on these productions work so closely together, and help you meet a lot of people, which is crucial. A good way to start is to PA (production-assist) - it is a thankless job, but you get your foot in the door and you're exposed to it all. And smart, motivated, dedicated people move up very quickly in this industry, so a Dartmouth grad will never PA for long. I'm also a big advocate for doing what you love - not what you think you are trained for or what you think will make you the most money. What you love will ALWAYS be what makes you the most successful - I've seen examples of it with my friends and acquaintances so many times since graduation. So even if it seems silly (like, hello, crafting!), go for it, and do it sooner rather than later.

AM: Do you have much interaction with Martha Stewart herself? Is she much different than her TV persona or the media portrayal of her?

Kirsten: I have a lot of interaction with her because I'm frequently one of the people prepping her for a show, running her through the craft segment that day. I also attend meetings with her and have even been invited to her home a few times. She's tough, as you probably imagine! And she keeps us all on our toes. But it's a challenge I love - and I am so honored to work with the person who made home keeping and entertaining a skill that women - and frankly anyone - can hone without feeling that it's frivolous or shameful. My mom raised me as a fierce feminist, but one who knows I can be a powerful woman and still make a fabulous pie or a kick-ass quilt, and Martha embodies that.

AM: Do you have any funny anecdotes from your time on the set?

Kirsten: There was one time I was on set preparing for a live show, and there was all this loud music being played to pump up the audience. If you've ever been in the audience of a TV show, you know it's very electric and hectic and exciting. On this particular day, Kermit the Frog was standing at the table next to me getting ready to do some gardening. Richard Simmons was another guest that day and he was running around like a lunatic in front of the audience, and he ran up to me and kissed me. Martha Stewart was a few feet away waiting to walk on, and I had this moment like, how the hell did I get here? It was so surreal and bizarre.

AM: If you could work on the set of any TV show, which would it be and why?

Kirsten: I'm quite happy to be working where I work because I really love the brand and the aesthetic that we promote - it's very much in line with my taste. But given my love of comedy and being challenged with creating bizarre and specialty props, it is another one of my dreams to build props for Saturday Night Live. I have watched some sketches where I have been so jealous of some of the stuff they got to create (Jon Hamm's John Ham, for instance).

AM: Congratulations on your Emmy! Did you get to attend the awards ceremony? Where did you put your Emmy?

Kirsten: Thank you so much! I actually chose not to attend the ceremony because it was in LA and I couldn't make it work with my schedule that particular weekend. Our department had one representative who went and accepted the award for us. My husband and I were out to dinner with another couple the night of the ceremony. They both left the table at one point, so I snuck a look at my iPhone to see if there was any news - and I had about 100 text messages congratulating me. I ran outside and screamed in the street. The waiter thought I ran outside to be sick, so we had to explain to him that no, it was actually a good kind of running-out-the-door, and then he brought our table some complimentary champagne to celebrate. I will always remember that night and I think it actually turned out to be more fun than sitting through a ceremony!

I haven't recieved my Emmy yet because I had to fill out a form that said how I wanted my name to appear in the engraving, etc., and I'm still waiting for it to be shipped. My husband and I joke that we're going to put it in the bathroom to keep us humble (like he heard Tom Hanks did with his Oscars), but it may just end up on our mantle. My family is scattered throughout New Jersey, so I have promised them I will do a Turnpike victory lap so they can all touch it and get pictures with it.

AM: Do you keep in touch with your Dartmouth friends?

Kirsten: I do - my husband is Dan Powell '00, so I definitely keep in touch with him. Our wedding, a little over 2 years ago, was on the BEMA, and was so packed with Dartmouth people that it was much like a reunion. My wedding party had heavy Dartmouth representation - Janice Ryan '00 was my maid of honor, and Jim McNicholas '01, Jim Noonan '01, and Marc Bruni '99 were my bridesmen. I'd definitely say that Dartmouth, has, by far, been the source of most of my lifelong friends, and I am so grateful for that.

AM: If you could go back and relive one Dartmouth moment, what would it be?

Kirsten: Oh ... so many moments hold special places in my heart, and while I suppose it's not a "moment," I'd have to say I'd give anything to go back and do Sophomore Summer again. How fun was that - am I right??

AM: Thank you so much for taking the time to speak with us. Congratulations again on the Emmy and we look forward to seeing more of your work!

Kirsten: Thanks so much - this is such an honor!

The Hanover Planning Board approved the College's proposed design for the Visual Arts Center by a 6-1 vote recently, following previous debate over the building's design and its effect on the downtown area. Before the College can break ground, the Spaulding loading dock must be reconstructed and both Brewster Hall and Clement Hall must be demolished. The building will be home to Dartmouth's Studio Art and Film & Media Studies departments and to the Lowe Auditorium, to be moved to the new building from the Hopkins Center.

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SEPTEMBER 11TH MEMORIAL DEDICATED



On June 19, 2009, former President James Wright and College Chaplain Richard Crocker spoke at a dedication ceremony for a memorial honoring the 11 members of the Dartmouth community who lost their lives during the September 11, 2001, terrorist attacks, including our classmate, Juan Cisneros. The memorial, pictured left, is located in the Zahm Courtyard (between the Hopkins Center and the Hanover Inn), among numerous other memorials, mostly to those in the Dartmouth family who died in various wars.
